Coming & Going—Bible Buddies!

⁶ Keep these words that I am commanding you today in your heart. ⁷ Recite them to your children and talk about them when you are at home and when you are away, when you lie down and when you rise. Deuteronomy 6:6-7

These words taken from the "Shema" are posted on the doorframes of Jewish homes, reminding all who go out and come in that they are to talk about God's commandments (God's Word) with one another morning, noon, and night as a way of remembering God's saving grace and of forming generations who know the stories and live as God's people.

When we served among the saints at Monticello Presbyterian Church, members young and old participated in a wonderful one-on-one intergenerational of ministry called, **Bible Buddies**. Each pair of buddies consisted of an elementary student and an older member. Each Bible Buddy pair would covenant to meet twice each month to do something fun and to study the Bible together. Every now and then, we would have Bible Buddy fellowship activities when all the Bible Buddies would gather for a tea or a game night.

Hannah's buddy was a young mother. Helen's buddy was a precious older saint. My Bible Buddy was precocious six-year-old Matilda. Matilda and I decided that we would study all the little books of the Bible, like Jonah and Jude, Ruth and Philemon because they could be read in one sitting. These little books challenged us as we talked about the context they were written in, and pondered their meaning for the people then and for us now. As you can imagine, I learned as much from her as she learned from me. We both enjoyed our time together.

Just like I told Callie Rose in church last Sunday, it is good to have a buddy when you have something very hard to do. Understanding scripture and applying it to life is very hard to do. It is helpful when we have companions who will help us to understand, and who will encourage us in our walk.

This is one of the great things about being church. We have a whole family of friends we can talk with about the scriptures. Hearing a perspective that is different from my own deepens my understanding of God's word. Working out a difficult passage with a group of friends and fellow followers of the Jesus way helps me grow as a disciple. This time together builds up the body of Christ and perhaps gives the body not only deeper roots, but a wider reach.

I know that Hannah's Bible Buddy and I are pleased and proud that Matilda and Hannah are now Bible Buddies, sharing in the word as it is preached in Washington, DC.

Sunday Study Series: Building Community with the Mentally Ill

The Christian Education & Nurture committee and the Missions & Outreach committee are working together to equip interested members of our congregation for more fully embracing our new partnership with Greenwood Place and NAMI. Toward that end, the August/September Sunday Study is exploring different facets of mental illness and its impact on individuals, families, and communities.



In particular, the study challenges us as Christians to address how our faith, our understanding of God, and our scientific knowledge of brain diseases all intersect. What are the challenges facing those in our area who live with persistent mental illness, and what are we called to do in response to their need?

The study kicked off on August 11, and thus far has included frank discussion of what we know (or *think* we know) now, and what we *want* to learn about mental illness. We've read and discussed *Blessed are the Crazy*, by Sarah Griffith Lund (see below). And we began our "Mental Illness 101" topic with an introduction to the neuro-chemistry, the effect of


psychological stress, and particularly schizophrenia or schizo-affective disorders. This last session was presented by Carol Scales, retired psychiatric nurse and current Board Chair for Greenwood Place.

Myth: Mental health problems don't affect me.

Fact: Mental health problems are actually very common. In 2014, about:

- One in five American adults experienced a mental health issue
- One in 10 young people experienced a period of major depression
- One in 25 Americans lived with a serious mental illness, such as schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, or major depression



Suicide is the 10th leading cause of death in the United States. It accounts for the loss of more than 41,000 American lives each year, more than double the number of lives lost to homicide. As part of our partnership with Greenwood Place and NAMI, remember to pray for those living with mental illness, including patients, caregivers, and their friends.
